## FEBRUARY WORKSHOP 2022 TEXTURED LETTERS AND ITALIC WITH BARBARA CLOSE Barbara's Workshop: A Treat Start to Finish

Barbara Close's workshop was like going to a sundae bar. She started us off with a plain old vanilla 'stem stroke'. Then toppings were raining down on us faster than I could keep pace. This was all before we even started exploring the Italic hand.

I was one of the people who undertook the class on my own time. I finally finished in over a month's time. I'll be honest, there was so much to digest, I watched many parts more than once.

We started by practicing the shape of stem strokes. Then we cut a stem stroke mask out to use for each time we created a letter. The stem stroke was a single part of a letter (see samples on various letters). We started the class making the stem big then scaling it to the size of our project.


After we mastered the stroke, we moved onto all those wonderful techniques. We learned to make designs on the stem including various flowers. These were done with dots, spirals, and teardrops. We also experimented making various shapes with a Micron pen and adding watercolor. Two techniques that I found fun were using a sponge dabbed with watercolors and using tissue paper on crumpled foil and then painting the tissue.

This was only the tip of the iceberg as we continued to learn more ideas. When we moved onto lettering, Barbara showed us how to do thin and wide Italic letters mixing them in a piece for effect.

#### **FEBRUARY WORKSHOP CONTINUED**


Barbara shared numerous samples of everything we did. Our class ended using all we learned to make a birthday card. We also made a portfolio to hold all our sample letters.















Floral painted envelope techniques learned in Brenda Walton & Mike Gold's Happy Mail workshop take envelope art to a whole new level. We learned several unique ways to address envelopes and I have really enjoyed expanding my flower painting repertoire.



I expanded it even further with Ann Pasquier's recent guild meeting workshop, Flat Brush Flowers. Never having worked with a flat brush before, I was pleasantly surprised at how versatile it is. After the workshop, I played with the strokes Ann taught us and was able to create even more flowers – lady slippers, irises, peonies, snapdragons, hydrangeas, and roses – all with the flat brush.

Barbara Close taught us a heap of new skills in Textured Letters with an Italic Twist. The creativity ignited in her classes is contagious! It was fun to break out the broad pen after many years and brush up on Italic, too.

## NEW BOOK BY ORA MURPHY



#### VERSALS CLASS WITH MARK VAN STONE

This piece was inspired by Mark Van Stone's Versals class which I purchased from the Texas Lettering Arts Council. I have always been fascinated by medieval manuscripts and I wanted to gain more practice and experience with versals. Mark is knowledgeable and engaging and I learned so much as he talked us through pages of examples from medieval manuscripts before sketching out the letters. He went through the basic structure along with different variations of every letter and then worked with us on condensed gothic versals. We practiced names for the exercises in class. It was an online recorded zoom and was about 4 hours. If you have a chance to take a class from Mark, I highly recommend him, especially if you love the work of medieval scribes.
