CCG FALL WORKSHOP CADELS WITH VIVIAN MUNGALL

On October 26 & 27, 2024, CCG members met for what will be, sadly, our last inperson workshop at Day Spring. Our instructor for this class was Vivian Mungall, a Cadel expert and author of the book "Cadels" available at John Neal.

From Vivian's notes, "a Cadel pattern is composed of a series of tape-like strokes, nearly parallel lines which interweave and knot together." These strokes can be used to create a letter.

Vivian started the workshop by telling us about her calligraphy journey. Then, armed with just pencils, we made our first attempts to work on some of the basic, easy patterns. She taught us that, to be a true Cadel, the pattern should be traceable from beginning to end without retracing any section. A true Cadel can be produced without lifting the pen when using a quill, but not possible with more modern tools.



Roman Holiday Conference June 22-29, 2024

I attended the Roman Holiday in-person conference hosted by the Chicago Calligraphy Collective at St. Ambrose University in Iowa from June 22-29.

Since I have never been to any of the calligraphic conferences before, I was surprised by what I learned. Fellow attendees and presenters were always willing to answer my many questions. And I had so much fun trying out different tools and shopping for calligraphy tools, books, and supplies. It was such a wonderful time for camaraderie: meeting new friends, seeing old friends, and meeting those whom I have only seen on Zoom for years!

My class was Gothic Cursive and Medieval Vellum, presented by Cheryl Jacobsen and Madison Bennett. In this full-week class we learned to process animal skins to vellum. We also received finished vellum (because the complete vellum making process is several weeks long) to produce a finished product.



I had a chance to see the finished projects from the other courses that were offered at the conference. Some examples of the courses were chiseling slate, creating paper, exploring new techniques, and working with internationally recognized calligraphers to further develop skills in the calligraphic world.

I hope all the other attendees had as much fun as I did!

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
ORGANIZING A TO Z A Visit to Joan Landrey's Studio

My studio is used for three hobbies, which are calligraphy, sumi-e painting and sewing/quilting. There is a separate work area for each centered in the middle of the room with storage space in the peripheral areas.

The need for storage has grown over the years with all the online classes, in person workshops and guild meetings producing ever more items to organize. I have taken a cue from Ann Pasquier and have had all handouts from classes spiral bound so I can find them when needed.

There are several storage cabinets divided into sections for pointed pen and broad edge. Bookshelves also lend much needed space for books, magazines and loose-leaf binders. Other areas are for sumi-e and sewing.

I recently bought a new desk for calligraphy that is now large enough to accommodate a laptop, paper, pens, inks and brushes within fingertip reach. There are cabinets right behind the desk which allow me to swivel around in the chair and to easily access items stored there. There is also a design wall behind the desk for pinning up posters, calligraphy pieces or whatever else I want to display.




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FROM THE ARCHIVES

HARVEST CRITTENDEN

Harvest is the owner of Acorn Arts in Michigan. She studied fine arts in college and in 1976 she began to study calligraphy under Dick Beasley. A new love was born lettering as an art form. She has been a lettering artist for more than 25 years. She is a past recipient of the Marjory Pavelich Calligraphy Grant, an instructor at The Birmingham Bloomfield Art Center and at Hollander's School of Book and Paper Arts. She teaches workshops around the country, and taught at The International Conferences of Lettering Arts.

Harvest has served as president of the Michigan Association of Calligraphers. She has exhibited in numerous juried shows and has been published in Somerset Studio magazine and Tabellae Ansatae magazine. Harvest lives with her husband Larry and daughter Emily, in a charming little town in Michigan.

In October of 2006 The Coastal Calligraphers Guild was privileged to

have Harvest instruct us in her "Voluptuous Vining" workshop. We discovered the secrets of creating full-bodied voluptuous vines. This was accomplished in a most enjoyable atmosphere. The final project was a hardbound notebook holder with a decorative initial and embellished with beautiful vines.

The beautiful calligraphic art that appears on this page was done especially for this newsletter and as a Christmas remembrance to Fred and Gene for taking care of her while she stayed with us during the workshop.

Workshops: Photos & Reviews Voluptuous Vining with Harvest Crittenden

Our workshop teacher, Harvest Crittenden, led us through three days of "Voluptuous Vining", preparing us for our piece de resistance, a small hand made book with an illuminated inital on the cover surrounded with suitable vines/ embelishments.

Using watercolors we learned the techniques of painting vines, leaves, flowers and bars with shading and all kinds of stuff going on. We learned how to look at an illuminated page and break it down so we could do it too! We worked with layout and design and combined, in a pleasing fashion, all the various bits we had learned to do to create our final piece.

I think we all loved the class and found Harvest to be a delightful and talented artist who is also a very effective teacher. student sample book>

ABECEDA: A Jazz Age Alphabet from Prague

<u>Abeceda</u> (literally: Alphabet) is the brainchild of Czech artist Karel Teige, an avant-garde artist, surrealist, graphic artist, typographer, and photographer who was a major figure throughout the 1920s. Teige's 1926 photomontage is a collection of innovative designs for the alphabet choreographed by dancer Milča Mayerová. In the photographs Mayerová evokes the letters of the alphabet through physical posture. This collection of photographs is elegant, unusual, and strikingly unique, which is why it remains one of the enduring masterpieces of Czech modernism.
