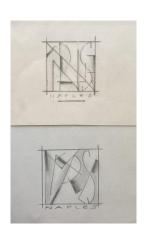


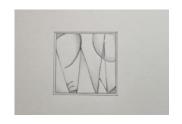

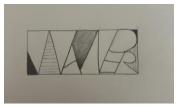
MARCH CCG WORKSHOP GRAPHITE EXPLORATIONS WITH BARBARA CLOSE

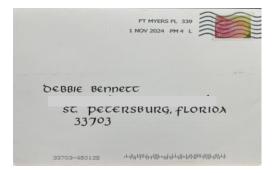
























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2024 CREATIVE CHALLENGE

MY IAMPETH CERTIFICATION JOURNEY (AND THOUGHTS ON THE PROCESS)

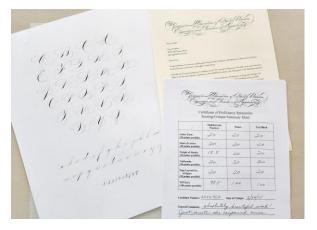
In recent years, the International Association of Master Penman, Engrossers, and Teachers of Handwriting, or IAMPETH as it is commonly known, has revamped their Master Penman program. They created a Certificate Program which is an incremental path to earning acknowledgement of your calligraphy skill. There are two possible certificates to earn in separate lettering and engrossing categories - Proficiency followed by Excellence. Ultimately, if desired, you can work to achieve the Master Penman designation.

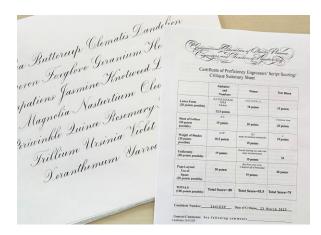
By IAMPETH's description, the Certificate of Proficiency acknowledges an applicant is at the "intermediate level" and must precede earning the Certificate of Excellence which signifies the "highest level" of skill in that specific category. The Master Penman designation is awarded after the penman has earned a Certificate of Excellence in each of three distinct areas: Pointed Pen, Broad Nib, and Decorative Arts as well as maintaining their IAMPETH membership without interruption. They then work with a designated mentor for two years while completing the Master Penman Certificate. Once achieved, they commit to teaching and sharing calligraphy as much as possible.

While the self-directed process is long and arduous, it offers an opportunity to hone one's skill of a particular script with a regimented exemplar and judgement process -- of which I have mixed feelings. After hundreds of hours of practice of E.A. Lupfer's Engrosser's Script (found on pages 2-8 of the Zanerian Manual), one would hope to become adept at the specific exemplar used. However, it overlooks any proficiency achieved with a different style of Engrosser's Script and points are lost even for variants of Lupfer's hand seen in other parts of the manual. This does not necessarily truly judge skill level but proficiency of your ability to mimic one particular example of one penman's style.

The judges rigidly assess the specimens to the exemplar which is important in terms of having an objective measurement. There is no allowance for differences in spacing, stroke placement, shade values, etc. But with such rigorous judgement does it really determine whether someone has achieved an "intermediate" skill level? I understand the reasoning to distinguish levels, but if you have already achieved 18 out of 20 points on all aspects of the script, have you not already achieved excellence? Because the judgement criteria for the Certificates of Proficiency and Excellence are the same and there is no room for misstep.

I would propose the Certificate of Proficiency should have either a lower standard of scoring (for example, instead of having to achieve 18 of the possible 20 points for each criteria, intermediate level would mean a score of 16 giving room for growth to excellence); or, preferably, the level of Proficiency be changed to indicate "Skilled or Competent" versus "Intermediate." And the level of Excellence represents true Mastery or Expert level. Because, after all, we are striving for excellence, not intermediacy, even for the Proficiency designation.

Although seemingly superfluous, the distinction is important. After years, or even decades, of lettering Engrosser's Script, I would propose most people would be at, or more likely, above an intermediate level. But the dedication and hard work necessary to achieve the Certificate of Proficiency is really beyond intermediate work. It requires careful study, hundreds of hours of concentrated practice of the exemplar given, and the ability to reproduce and implement it without flaws.

However, the standard for achievement is not unreasonable. It is exactly what it should be – rigorous, meticulously judged, and its award reserved for those who achieve the highest level of skill. But its assessment of "intermediate" just does not fit the accomplishment (or lack thereof).

Philosophical musing aside, the process itself was an incredible journey of studying, learning, and truly understanding the idiosyncrasies of the scripts. I am happy to have earned the Certificate of Proficiency for Spencerian Script, a style I have been practicing for over thirty years. However, I would say I was not truly studying or improving in the script until the last five years or so. Unfortunately, I did not earn the Certificate for Engrosser's Script, a style I have done for even longer.

But in reading the detailed report for my entry, the judges' assessment is spot on. I was able to see more clearly, areas needing improvement, and what my shortcomings of the script are. Initially, after completing several months of hours of daily practice preparing my first submission, I thought if I did not succeed, I would not try again. But seeing where I can improve offers me an opportunity that I feel embodies what doing the art of calligraphy is really all about — moving forward and continuing our practice so we can improve our hand and better our art.

With that in mind, I spent three months this spring in David Grimes' *Dreaming in Script* Beginner Engrosser's Script course (see separate article, "I've Been Dreaming in Script." And I am in the process of trying again to do "intermediate" (or better) work and earn that certificate!

I'VE BEEN "DREAMING IN SCRIPT"

As part of the IAMPETH certification process, one must undergo intensive study of the script to reach the highest level of proficiency. After careful study of my own work, it was clear to me that several intricacies of Engrosser's Script had passed me by in all my years of its study. Instead of going back to the drawing board in autodidactic pursuit, I turned to David Grimes, an accomplished penman, mentor, teacher, and friend.

David, <u>masgrimes.com</u>, has created an incredible online calligraphy school called Dreaming in Script. He offers extensive courses in Engrosser's Script, Off-hand Flourishing, and French Ronde Hand, just to name a few. His approach is both intensive and thorough but his warm and comforting guidance makes the experience even better.

The Beginner Engrosser's Script course is approximately 8 weeks long in which the style is broken down into named and numbered strokes — both connective hairlines and shades. Although the style of Engrosser's Script is exclusively David's own (the Grimes Method), it offers an in-depth look into the hand in general, including several other historical variations. So, while it is not the style needed for the IAMPETH certificate, it does train you to see the script more clearly and how to execute the necessary strokes, spacing, and what David calls "essential qualities" of the letters. The coursework is supported by a fabulous community in which students of all experience levels offer critique. David has fostered an incredible sense of camaraderie coupled with razor sharp but gentle and kind constructive feedback.

The class unequivocally improved my Engrosser's Script (see before and after image). It allowed me to see mistakes I had been making for years and how to improve them. While the course moves at a rapid pace, it allows a deep dive into the script, and I finished with a renewed enthusiasm for both learning and a desire to improve. I highly recommend it!

MY JOURNEY SETTING GOALS FOR CALLIGRAPHY RESULTS

After 40 years working in the business world, and now retired, I started 2024 with the determination to set goals with my calligraphy hobby.

Why set a goal? Although I am just a calligraphy hobbyist, I was disappointed with my progress since embarking on the calligraphy journey about seven years earlier. And following the adage "To do the same thing over and over and expect a different outcome is insanity," Therefore in January 2024 I set a goal to focus on the Engrosser's and Spencerian scripts.

Now with the intention, how to proceed? My first goal was to master Engrosser's script.

I researched various instructors and was impressed with Kalo Cho (kalomakeart.com). Her Instagram posts, her willingness to share her journey, fabulous teaching style, and detailed handouts, resulted in signing up for her Engrosser's script online class. It was amazing, and I rewatched her 10 hours of class videos three more times. The result: I finally felt accomplished with that script.

After that successful learning experience, and four months of focusing on Engrosser's script, I was ready to sign up for Kalo's Spencerian class.

It was another fabulous learning experience, and I watched the 10 hours of video three times again.

With my goal accomplished, what was next? I saw that the IAMPETH conference was offering a never before offered class: Intensive Spencerian with Michael Ward, limited to 25 students. To be considered for this opportunity a specific submission was required.

Therefore, I set the goal of practicing the required submission using the skills learned in Kalo's class. And, after diligently practicing for four weeks, and submitting my work, I was accepted!

Tips that worked for me during my calligraphic goal setting:

- 1. Research the instructor. Are they knowledgeable? How are their handouts? What is their teaching style? Do they consider their pace and level of detail from the student's perspective?
- 2. Delivery of instruction. If online, how long will the videos be available?
- 3. Be open to trying out new tools. During my process, my arthritis interfered in my ability to write/practice. I heard about Erica McPhee's (florishforum.com) new oblique holder, Curve-E. I purchased one holder set up for a Hunt 101 and it was a game changer in a positive way. I then purchased another setup with a Niko G for Spencerian. It is so comfortable, and I can practice as long as I choose.
- 4. Do not be afraid to set a goal!
- 5. And do not be afraid to set an even higher goal, like submitting work to take an advanced class such as the Intensive Spencerian class with Mike Ward!

In conclusion: Goals are great in business and in calligraphy! Many thanks to Kalo and Mike Ward for being phenomenal instructors and Curve-E Pens for comfortable oblique holders!

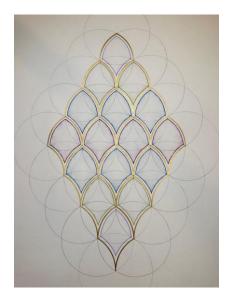

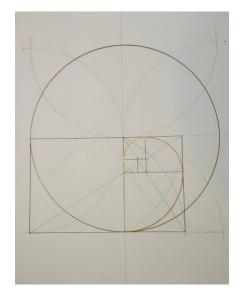
INTRODUCTION TO GEOMETRIC ART WITH CLARISSA GRADI

Clarissa Grandi, an artist and former math teacher based in the UK, taught this wonderful workshop on creating various forms of geometric art. Clarissa began the workshop with her story of how her journey started in school with math and art being her favorite subjects, and then began exploring the world of mathematical art during her teaching career. She has authored books on the subject, *Artful Maths*, teaches online workshops and still works with students in the schools tapping into their creative side and making math fun.

I must admit, I was not the best geometry student and was quite surprised by the simplicity of the construction while learning the basics one step at a time. The process is almost rhythmic once you get started. Clarissa clearly demonstrated the process of creating the different designs using color to highlight each layer, which makes it a lot easier to find the shapes within the drawing.

A brief overview of the coursework included Mandalas with circles, Sixfold Alhambra patterns hiding in the "flower of life," Fivefold symmetry and the golden ratio, Fourfold Islamic patterns, and Gothic tracery. Each pattern began with a point on the page, then a line, followed by a circle. The only tools necessary to construct the designs were a pencil, ruler for drawing lines and a compass. As always, additional materials are fun to use for decorative purposes.

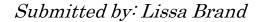






GEOMETRIC ART...CONTINUED

During each session, Clarissa shared photos of the many sources of her inspiration through architecture and design and demonstrated techniques for enhancing the finished patterns using watercolors, colored pencils, gold pens and shading. The possibilities are endless! She was so generous with her knowledge and talent, and her enthusiasm was contagious. I am looking forward to taking another workshop in September featuring the Geometric Language of Roman Mosaics.

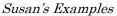

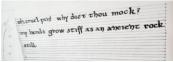

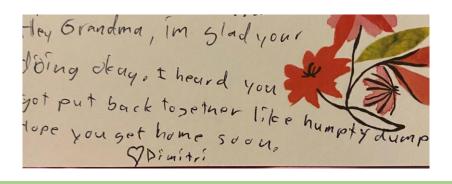

Dear Gail and Bob.

The "100 for John" was a smashing success! Dad has been overwhelmed by opening the letters and receiving such warm wishes for a happy birthday. I know you're wondering about where they came from, and other things, so here's some information about the project:

How many cards did the project get?

Cards from Kids: The Odyssey Charter School sent 45 handmade cards, with many of them signed by multiple children

There were also 31 hand drawn cards in blank envelopes.

Addressed envelopes: Dad received 110 separate cards sent through the mail.

Total cards: All counted, the "100 for John" project had 186 cards! What a wonderful gift!

Where did the cards come from?

Dad received cards from 22 different states, and from 4 additional countries. WOW! A few cards had no identifying info on them.

What did the cards say?

The sentiments expressed on the cards were absolutely fabulous. So many senders used the information you shared about Dad to make a connection, so many cards referred to his military service, his WV background, and his love of golf. People shared about their parents or other family members who served in WWII, telling where they were stationed, or family members who are currently serving in the military. Others shared a love for WV or talked about family members from WV, including one whose father grew up in Elkins, WV, which is only 20 minutes from where Mother grew up! Some shared about their children, or their age – one person shares Dad's birthday of September 5. Another hopes to live to 100, as that's the only way her golf game will match her age. And many, many people mentioned the two of you in their cards. All the cards expressed the writer's best wishes for Dad to have a wonderful birthday, and a desire for him to enjoy his memories of looking back over 100 years. The youngest person who mentioned their age is 11, another is 18. Based on information about their parents, I guess that many are in our age range.

What did the cards look like?

Dad received many exquisite, fantastic cards with outstanding artwork. Such creativity and talent! A lot of beautiful calligraphy was in the addressing of the envelope! I'm going to take pictures of some and send them to you in a separate message. Some cards were store-bought, some being specifically to celebrate a 100 th birthday. All expressed much kindness and love.

How did John feel about the project?

Dad was quite overwhelmed! Reading each of these cards, with such sweet thoughts, brought us all to tears. Not only was it a card at a time, but the impact of card after card after card. Dad frequently said, "I can't believe these people did this for me – someone they don't even know. It really restores my faith in humanity, that people will support each other." And "people all over the country will know my name."

I can't express in words how much I appreciate your thinking of such a wonderful way to celebrate Dad, and then the wonderful execution! It is a project that has touched each of us deeply, and I love you all the more for doing it. Dad is so proud and humbled to be the recipient of such an outpouring of love! You two had so many creative and fun surprises, including the Marines and contacting West Virginia University (WVU). Thank you, thank you!
